




Occupancy - Year to Date Average 2021 (Jan-Dec) - 2022 (Jan-Oct)







Key Findings


- In 2022, the year to date average occupancy across BC regions is **59%** however, this may change as the year progresses
- BC's average occupancy rate for the year 2021 accounted for **54.8%**
- In 2022, Vancouver Island had the highest YTD average occupancy rate with **67%**, followed by Kootenay Rockies with **60%**, Thompson Okanagan with **58%**, Cariboo Chilcotin Coast and Northern BC with **55%** each.
- In 2021 Vancouver Island averaged **65%**, Kootenay Rockies averaged **55%**, Thompson Okanagan averaged **54%**, Northern BC averaged **52%**, and Cariboo Chilcotin Coast averaged **48%**






- In 2022, the year to date ADR across BC regions is \$197.20 however, this may change as the year progresses
- BC's Average Daily Rate for the year 2021 accounted for \$191.40
- In 2022, Thompson Okanagan had the highest YTD ADR with **\$275**, followed by Kootenay Rockies with **\$206**, Vancouver Island with **\$203**, Cariboo Chilcotin Coast with **\$161**, and Northern BC with **\$141**
- In 2021 Thompson Okanagan averaged **\$252**, Kootenay Rockies averaged **\$240**, Vancouver Island averaged **\$187**, Cariboo Chilcotin Coast averaged **\$153**, and Northern BC averaged **\$125**







- In 2022, Thompson Okanagan had the highest YTD RevPAR with **\$160**, followed by Kootenay Rockies with **\$149**, Vancouver Island with **\$139**, Cariboo Chilcotin Coast with **\$93**, and Northern BC with **\$79**
- In 2021 Thompson Okanagan averaged **\$138**, Kootenay Rockies averaged **\$133**, Vancouver Island averaged **\$123**, Cariboo Chilcotin Coast averaged **\$75**, and Northern BC averaged **\$65**







Glossary

- Occupancy: Calculated by the number of occupied rooms divided by the number of available rooms that physically exist in a hotel
- Average Daily Rate (ADR): Represents the average rental income per paid occupied room in a given time period, however, ADR itself cannot be used to measure a hotel's performance
- Revenue per Available Room (RevPAR): Calculated by multiplying a hotel's ADR by its occupancy rate, an increase in RevPAR most likely indicates an improvement in occupancy rate and can be used to measure a hotel's performance
- Listings Supply (Nights): Total number of Available Nights + Booked Nights from Active Listings
- Listings Demand (Nights): Total number of Booked Nights during the reporting period
