




# Four phases

- The four phases of emergency planning, include mitigation, preparedness, response and recovery:
  - Mitigation: identification, removal, or reduction of hazards, to either reduce the likelihood of emergencies or to reduce their potential impacts
  - Preparedness: building knowledge and capacity in anticipation of emergencies
  - Response: taking measures to respond to an emergency, including to prevent or reduce the impacts of the emergency
  - Recovery: taking measures to restore health, safety, and well-being after an emergency



## Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan

Advance a **four-phases** and all-hazard approach in alignment with **Sendai Framework.** 

Uphold Indigenous
knowledge and incorporate
best practices in cultural
safety, and structures for
communication and
coordination

Create an industry-leading network of plans that is outcome-focused, agile, and useful in emergencies.

Clarify the connection and alignment of the new framework with the CEMP, BCEMS, and other plans.

Update roles and responsibilities to be clearer, more prescriptive and reflective an all-of society approach.

Creating an operational framework that provides information and supports regulated entities' implementation of EDMA.

## Plans in B.C. must include:


- (a) measures that are necessary or advisable for the purposes of each phase;
- (b) the roles, powers and duties of persons identified in the plan by name, title or position;
- (c) requirements for emergency resources;
- (d) procedures for engaging emergency systems;
- (e) the emergency management training and exercise programs that will be conducted;
- (f) measures to mitigate any adverse effects of an emergency on
  - (i) individuals who may experience intersectional disadvantage, and
  - (ii) vulnerable individuals, animals, places or things;
- (g) measures to promote cultural safety;
- (h) any prescribed matters.



#### Considerations for tourism

- Mitigating impacts to local businesses and economies before, during and after emergencies
- Supporting tourists and non-locals in an emergency (language barriers, lack of local knowledge)
- Supporting tourism industry and businesses through recovery






## Opportunities

- Supporting and providing guidance for the inclusion of tourists and tourism sector in community plans
- Identifying actions across government to support tourists and the tourism industry during emergencies
- Coordinating preparedness and mitigation actions through the Tourism Emergency Management Committee (TEMC)
